Hanukkah, also known as the Festival of Lights, is an eight-day Jewish holiday commemorating the rededication of the Second Temple in Jerusalem after its defilement by the Seleucid Greeks.

It celebrates the miraculous event where a small amount of oil, enough to last one day, burned for eight days in the temple's menorah.

The holiday is marked by lighting the menorah, reciting blessings, playing dreidel, and enjoying traditional foods like latkes and sufganiyot.

The New Testament references Hanukkah in John 10:22-23, which states:

"Then came the Festival of Dedication at Jerusalem. It was winter, and Jesus was in the temple courts walking in Solomon's Colonnade."

The "Festival of Dedication" refers to Hanukkah, highlighting Yeshua's (Jesus') presence in the Temple during this celebration, affirming its significance in Jewish life during His time.

Blessings for Hannukah

One candle is added to the menorah each night. The first night, you light only the shammus (the one at a different height) and one Hannukah candle. By the eighth night, you light all of the candles.

Candles should be added to the menorah from right to left (like Hebrew writing).

The shammus candle is lit first. While holding the shammus candle, recite the following blessings. They are usually sung.



First Night Blessing

Baruch atah Adonai Blessed are you, Lord

Eloheinu, melech ha'olam our God, sovereign of the universe

asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav Who has sanctified us with His commandments

v'tzivanu l'hadlik neir and commanded us to light the lights

shel Chanukah. (Amen) of Channukah. (Amen)



<u>Shehecheyanu</u>

Baruch atah Adonai Blessed are you, Lord

Eloheinu, melech ha'olam our God, sovereign of the universe

shehecheyanu v'kiyimanu, v'higi'anu who has kept us alive, sustained us, and enabled us to reach

laz'man hazeh. (Amen) this season (Amen)

Blessing for the Hannukah Miracle

Baruch atah Adonai Blessed are you, Lord

Eloheinu, melekh ha'olam our God, sovereign of the universe

she'asah nisim la'avoteinu who performed miracles for our ancestors

bayamim haheim in those days

baziman hazeh. (Amen) at this time. (Amen)



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
